What makes vernal pools so important?

Potential rare & endangered species habitat

- Blanding's Turtle
- Spotted Turtle
- Ringed Boghaunter Dragonfly
- Ribbon Snake

Enhanced ecosystem services

• Exports carbon & nutrients to adjacent forested uplands.

Significant wildlife habitat

 Areas that are designated as significant vernal pools are protected by law under the Natural Resources Protection Act.

Education & research

• There are ongoing efforts by the University of Maine researchers in the Dept. of Wildlife Ecology to identify vernal pools & educate communities about vernal pool ecology.

"The loss of vernal pools and the critical terrestrial habitat around them leads to local loss of amphibian species, a decrease in biodiversity, and a decline in food available for many other animals that live in these areas."
